

QUICK FACTS 2013-14

Since it was founded in 1972, George Mason University has grown into a major educational force and earned a reputation as an innovative, entrepreneurial institution. Just minutes from Washington, D.C., George Mason has a growing and diverse student body and an exceptional faculty of enterprising scholars. At the center of the world's political, information, and communications networks, George Mason is the university needed by a region and a world driven by new social, economic, and technological realities.

George Mason's development has been shaped in response to the educational needs of its cosmopolitan constituency. The university has gained national distinction in a range of academic fields, including public policy, information technology, economics, fine and performing arts, law, conflict resolution, and most recently, biosciences.

Strong alliances with business, the community, and government benefit George Mason's students and the larger society. Enrollment is 33,917, with students studying in 200 degree programs at the bachelor's, master's, doctoral, and professional levels.

Mason is a distributed university with campuses in Fairfax, Arlington, and Prince William counties. In addition to these three campuses, George Mason operates a site in Loudoun County and has partnered with the Smithsonian Institute to offer a Global Conservation Studies Program at the Conservation and Research Center in Front Royal. Each location has a distinctive academic focus that plays a critical role in the economy of its region.

- For the sixth consecutive year, *U.S. News & World Report* included Mason on its Up-and-Coming School list. Mason was one of the few select universities that made the most promising and innovative changes in academics, faculty, students, campus, or facilities.
- Mason has been recognized for the retention and graduation rates of its historically under-represented students. Most recently, the *Education Trust* recognized Mason as one of the few national universities with little to no difference in graduation rates among African American and Hispanic students and white students.
- In 2013, Mason was included in the top 200 universities by the *Academic Ranking of World Universities*, which is conducted annually by Shanghai Jiao Tong University's Institute of Higher Education.
- *Kiplinger's Personal Finance* magazine again included Mason in its national top 100 "Best Values in Public Colleges" list. According to the magazine, it bases the rankings of public colleges on "a combination of outstanding academic quality plus an affordable price tag."
- For the sixth year in a row, the *Chronicle of Higher Education*, the premier publication for academic news and issues, named Mason one of the "Great Colleges to Work For."
- Mason was ranked number 81 among the top 100 of "America's Best College Buys" in a report compiled by *Forbes* magazine and the Center for College Affordability and Productivity.
- Mason ranks 156th in research expenditures on the National Science Foundation's Annual Research and Development Survey.
