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UNIVERSITY PROFILE

Located in Northern Virginia with the nation's capital nearby, George Mason University is in the mainstream of the political, artistic, and professional life of the country. Situated on 677 wooded acres near the City of Fairfax, the university's Fairfax Campus combines the quiet of a suburban setting with accessibility to Washington's libraries, galleries, and museums; Virginia's historic sites; and Fairfax County's high-technology firms. Metrorail, the Washington area's subway system, enables GMU riders to reach the U.S. Capitol in 35 minutes. It also provides a quick ride to GMU's 5.2-acre Arlington Campus, which houses the law school, a professional center, and a conference center. Its 124-acre campus in Prince William County offers academic, community, and business support programs.

The university's reputation for innovation results from its intent to be a world-class university built on a regional base. George Mason University is committed to meeting the needs of a highly sophisticated Northern Virginia community often characterized as a prototype of the high-tech, information/service-based economy of a post-industrial, knowledge-driven era.

George Mason University is a distinctive and diverse metropolitan teaching and research university that serves the national capital region. Understanding the needs of the region and the future development of the commonwealth, George Mason University is poised to meet the challenges of the new century. The university is exploring new approaches to a variety of needs: new curricula for undergraduates, new advanced degrees supportive of the Information Age, new openings on the cutting edge of telecommunications, new arrangements between the corporate world and higher education, new ways to serve the region's network of urban centers, and new cooperative arrangements with state government agencies and the private sector. George Mason is committed to ensuring that each new program will meet the university's standard of excellence--a world-class teaching and research faculty for a region that demands and deserves the best.

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE UNIVERSITY

- 2,130 first-time freshmen enrolled in Fall 1999, making it the largest freshman class in George Mason history.
- 5,097 degrees and certificates were awarded in 1998-99.
- Graduate students make up 34% of the student population.
- The College of Arts and Sciences enrolls 28.6% of the total population and 35.4% of all undergraduates.
- 2,729 students lived in residential or university-owned housing in Fall 1999.
- Among students receiving financial aid, the average aid award for 1999-00 is \$6,757; for institutional aid is \$4,311.
- 32% of students are minority or non-resident aliens and 56% are female.
- There were 881 full-time instructional and research faculty in Fall 1999.
- There were 594 part-time faculty in Fall 1999.
- 53.3% of full-time faculty are tenured, 14.1% are on probationary tenure track, and 32.6% are restricted.
- 82.4% of full-time faculty have a terminal degree.
- Mason's 1998-99 E&G budget is approximately \$174 million.
- Over \$33 million in research expenditures are projected in 1999-00.
- In 1998-99 the University Libraries system held 829,853 volumes.

GEORGE MASON: THE MAN

When George Mason of Gunston Hall wrote the Virginia Declaration of Rights in 1776, he gave the United States the noble concept that the rights of the individual must be protected against the power of government. By placing in Virginia's first constitution a list of rights that could never be taken away from citizens, Mason sought to ensure a society in which government could not become all-powerful.

As a result of his influence, the Bill of Rights, which was based on Mason's Declaration of Rights, was added to the U.S. Constitution. The universal significance of this action made the American Revolution much more than a war for independence from Great Britain: it enshrined in our most important public document the principle that a government must always respect the rights of the people.

Mason, himself a slave owner, did not recognize that these rights extended to slaves. Nevertheless, his words were later used to demonstrate that slavery could not exist in a country that proclaimed its belief in human rights. In the United States, we have not always adhered to Mason's great ideas, but they remain the measure of the best in our national life.

HISTORY OF THE UNIVERSITY

George Mason University began as the Northern Virginia branch of the University of Virginia in 1957, offering courses in engineering and the liberal arts. Called University College, it opened in a renovated elementary school in Bailey's Crossroads with an enrollment of 17 students.

Eager to support this novice institution, the Town (now City) of Fairfax purchased 150 acres in 1958 and donated it to the University of Virginia in order for a permanent branch campus to be located in Northern Virginia. The following year, the University of Virginia Board of Visitors selected the name George Mason College. Construction of the campus's first four buildings (North, South, East, West), was completed in 1964. In September of that year, 356 students began their studies in the new classrooms.

In March 1966, the General Assembly authorized the expansion of George Mason College into a four-year, degree-granting institution and gave it the long-range mandate to expand into a major regional university. The first senior class received degrees in June 1968. Graduate programs began in September 1970 with the first master's degrees conferred in June 1971. The George Mason College Board of Control, supported by citizens of Alexandria, Falls Church, Arlington, and Fairfax counties acquired an additional 442 acres. By the end of 1970, the college's Fairfax Campus reached 571 acres; it is now 677 acres.

In 1972, the Board of Visitors of the University of Virginia recommended that the college separate from its parent institution. On April 7, 1972, the governor signed the General Assembly legislation that established George Mason University as an independent member of the commonwealth's system of colleges and universities.

In 1979, George Mason was given the authority to grant doctoral degrees and began offering programs at this level. In the same year, the university acquired George Mason University School of Law located at the Arlington Campus.

In 1984, the first Robinson Professors, a group of outstanding scholars committed to undergraduate teaching and interdisciplinary scholarship, joined the faculty as a result of a generous bequest from Clarence J. Robinson.

HISTORY OF THE UNIVERSITY (continued)

Drawing prominent scholars from all fields, George Mason's outstanding faculty also includes Pulitzer Prize winners, IEEE Centennial Medalists, and recipients of numerous grants and awards including Fulbrights, National Science Foundation, and National Endowment of the Arts, among others. Endowed chairs have also brought many artists and scholars to campus.

In 1985, George Mason University, in partnership with area businesses, developed an engineering program geared toward the emerging information technology field and started the School of Information Technology and Engineering. The School of Information Technology and Engineering (IT&E) is concerned primarily with study areas that involve integrating the information basis for modern engineering with the more conventional physical and materials science approach. The careful integration of these areas results in a unique academic experience for highly motivated students. Through IT&E, George Mason was the first in the country to offer a doctoral degree in information technology.

The establishment of the Institute of the Arts in 1990 solidified the university's commitment to make the arts a pervasive part of students' lives. The Center for the Arts and the arts complex, which includes an art gallery, art studio, a rehearsal space, and performing venues such as TheaterSpace, are all components of the institute. The Institute of the Arts strives to maintain a balance between presenting master works of the past and creating a vital atmosphere for the production of new work. The institute is dedicated to the support and encouragement of all artists, including those of culturally diverse backgrounds, from here and abroad.

In April 1996, the innovative George W. Johnson Center opened. The Johnson Center's eight acres of floor space houses a 25,000-volume book collection, media center, computer labs, bank, bookstore, convenience store and food services. By combining student life resources with educational support, George Mason has created the learning workspace of the future. The center fosters university-wide learning by integrating students' curricular and extracurricular activities and by strengthening relationships among the university communities.

Since 1972, the university's development has been marked by rapid growth and innovative planning. In 27 years, enrollment has risen from 4,166 to 24,180 in Fall 1999. George Mason has expanded its presence to serve the entire Northern Virginia region by employing the revolutionary concept of the "distributed" university. In collaboration with county and state governments, the university established a campus in Prince William County. A partnership with American Type Culture Collection, the world's foremost archive of living cultures, has led to academic programs focusing on bioinformatics and makes Prince William County a center for biomedical technology. The new Prince William Campus opened its doors in September of 1997. The university is also expanding its presence in Arlington, home of the George Mason University School of Law, where a new building has been constructed and an increase in programming ranging from business to international transactions is planned.

George Mason University has achieved national distinction in many areas. Its reputation continues to grow as the university provides for an educational, cultural, and economic resource for the people of Northern Virginia, the Commonwealth of Virginia, and the nation.

George Mason University's growing reputation as an innovative educational leader is rooted in Virginia's strong education tradition. By emphasizing the needs of its region--high technology, public policy, and the fine and performing arts--George Mason has created a curriculum and mission to meet the needs of Northern Virginia's extraordinary cosmopolitan constituency.

MISSION STATEMENT

The mission statement for George Mason University reads as follows:

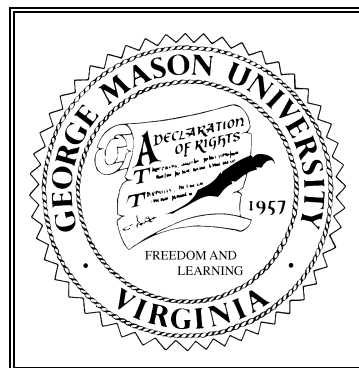

FACILITIES OPEN TO THE PUBLIC

George W. Johnson Center: The Center has 8-acres of floor space and houses a 25,000-volume book collection, media center, computer labs, bank, bookstore, convenience store, food services. Specially outfitted spaces provide opportunities for film, dance, meetings, and private study. The center fosters university-wide learning by integrating students' curricular and extracurricular activities and by strengthening relationships between the university communities.

Center for the Arts: The Center for the Arts complex includes the 2,000-seat Concert Hall, two experimental theaters, three dance studios, and music and fine arts studios. 500 Concert Hall tickets are available free to students for each performance.

Patriot Center: Patriot Center is a 10,000-seat sports and entertainment arena designed for basketball, concerts, and other sports and entertainment events.

Recreation Sports Complex: The complex features 113,900 square feet and includes a 200-meter track, 6 basketball courts, 4 tennis courts, 7 volleyball courts, 8 handball/racquetball courts, a batting cage, golf and archery nets, fencing lanes, locker rooms, a weight room, and saunas. It also features a 400-meter outdoor track, soccer field, baseball diamond, and other athletic fields.

Aquatic and Fitness Center: The 66,000 square foot two-pool complex includes a 3,500 square foot fitness gallery, four classrooms, whirlpool and co-ed sauna with men's and women's shower/locker room and family changing area.

Freedom Aquatic and Fitness Center: The 110,000 square foot complex is located on the Prince William campus as a result of a partnership between GMU, Prince William County and the City of Manassas. The center includes a 50-meter 10-lane competition pool, 7,000 sq. ft. leisure pool with a two-story figure-eight waterslide, current channels and whirlpool, weight training room, fitness assessment labs, cardiovascular fitness areas, 2 basketball courts, elevated running/walking track, 3 racquetball courts and daycare facilities for infants and toddlers.

ATHLETIC PROGRAMS

Over 330 student-athletes compete in 20 men's and women's Division I sports--baseball, basketball, cross country, diving, golf, lacrosse, rowing, soccer, softball, swimming, tennis, indoor and outdoor track and field, volleyball, and wrestling. Intercollegiate men's and women's teams are members of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) Division I, the Colonial Athletic Association (CAA), the Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC), and the Intercollegiate Association of Amateur Athletes of America (IC4A).

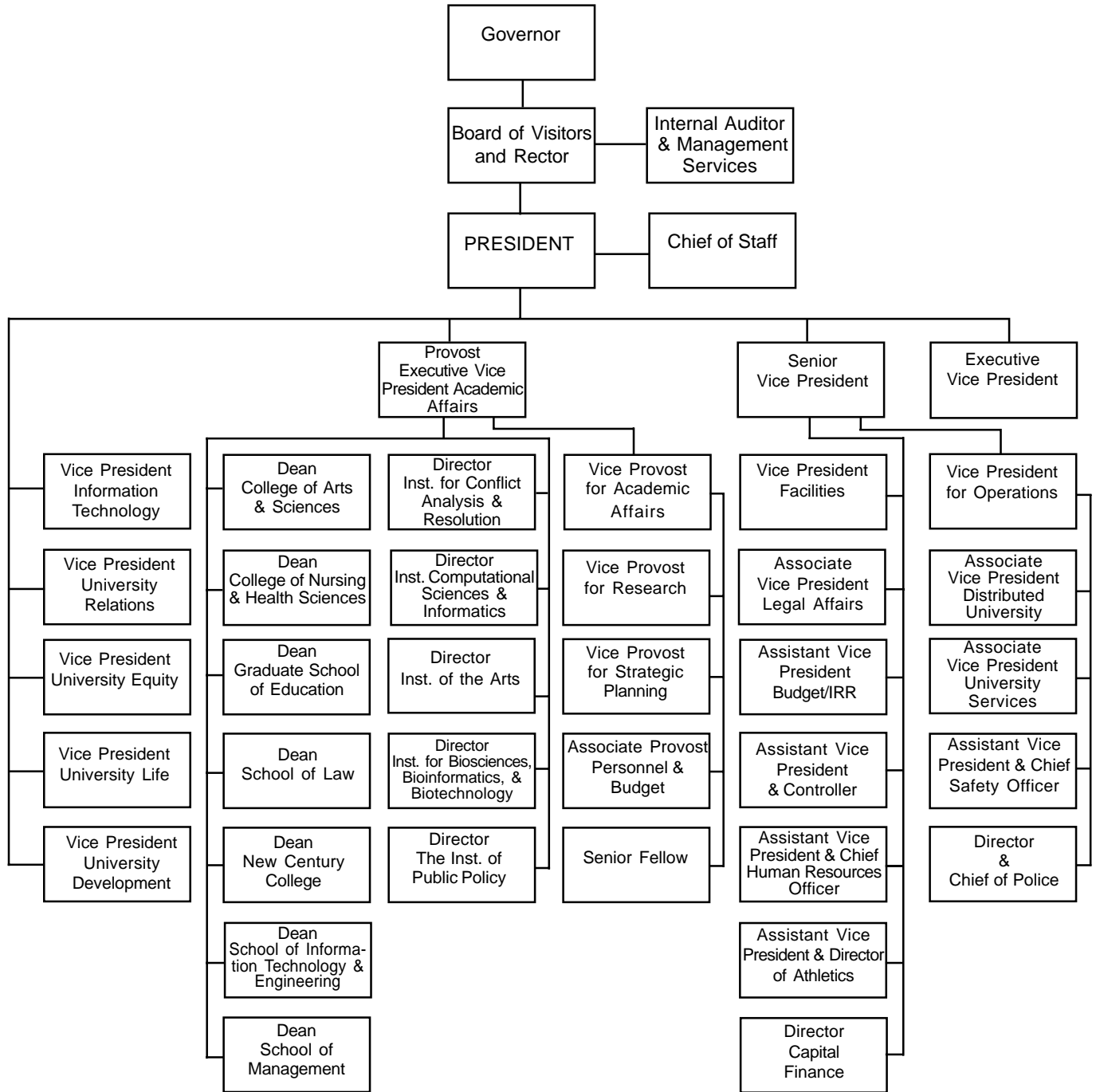

STATE COUNCIL OF HIGHER EDUCATION FOR VIRGINIA

The State Council of Higher Education for Virginia (SCHEV) is the Commonwealth's coordinating body for higher education. Established in 1956 by the General Assembly and the Governor, the Council's purpose is "to promote the development and operation of an educationally and economically sound, vigorous, progressive and coordinated system of higher education in Virginia." By statute, the Council makes policy recommendations to the Governor and General Assembly affecting Virginia's outstanding system of higher education in such areas as budget planning, enrollment projections, and student financial aid, among others. The Council also implements a wide variety of higher education programs which benefit students, faculty and taxpayers.

The Council of Higher Education consists of 11 members who are appointed by the Governor to four-year terms. The director, who is appointed by the Council, manages a 44-member staff and the state agency's \$57 million operations and grants appropriation for higher education.

FISCAL YEARS 1996-97 THROUGH 1999-2000**

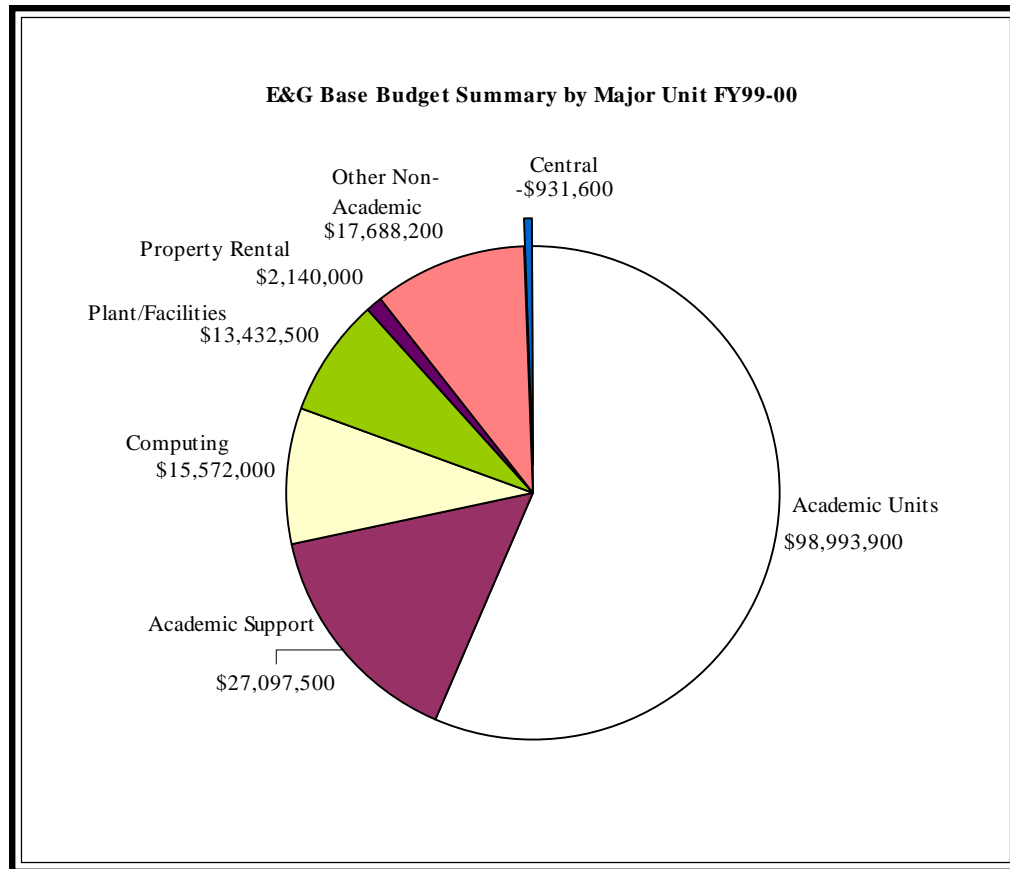

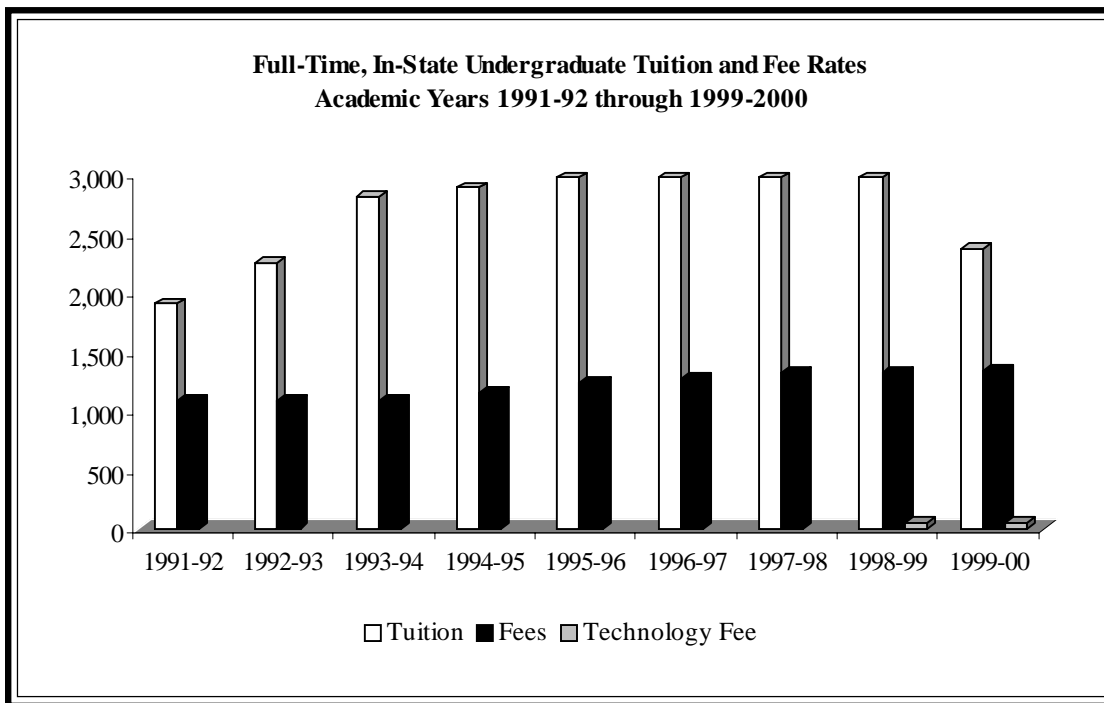
**AUXILIARY ENTERPRISES FUND BUDGETED REVENUES AND EXPENDITURES

UNIVERSITY LIBRARIES

George Mason University Libraries is comprised of the Charles Rogers Fenwick Library and the George W. Johnson Center Library on the Fairfax Campus and the Arlington Campus and Prince William Campus libraries. The School of Law Library, which is administered separately, is located on the Arlington Campus. All of the libraries offer support for student and faculty research and learning. In addition, the Libraries' resources and services are accessible to the University's surrounding communities and the general public.

The University Libraries' information technology assisted and enhanced services and programs include:

- An online library management system – Voyager — employed to conduct many aspects of library operations (acquisition of materials, cataloging, circulation, course reserves, management reporting), as well as provide an online public access catalog (OPAC) which reflects the holdings of all George Mason University libraries.
- The Libraries' homepage provides access to a variety of networked resources and services (over 300 licensed scholarly digital databases many of which are full-text; patron-initiated circulation; online reference assistance; and web-based communication with library staff for document delivery requests; requests for acquisition of specific resources; placement of materials on reserve for designated courses; and other services.
- A CD-ROM network that brings specialized electronic resources not available through the Internet to each of our library facilities.
- A Web-based Electronic Reserves module allowing students to access materials on course reserve remotely.
- Microform to digital format output technology, and statistical software packages and Geographic Information System (GIS) software.
- Over 200 networked computer workstations, connected to laser printers, available for student and faculty use in designated "public" areas in all of the libraries.
- In addition, the University community benefits from ready access to the ALADIN system – the Washington Research Libraries Consortium (WRLC) online union catalog of academic library holdings and other resources and services in the national capital metropolitan region.

Complementing our commitment to information technology, the Libraries' Liaison Librarian program matches subject specialist librarians with academic units to provide strong support for a number of cooperative and collaborative programs. The Libraries provide an inter-campus delivery service for students and faculty requesting materials held at any one of the other George Mason libraries. Materials not held within the University Libraries system may be obtained by direct patron initiated borrowing from WRLC institution libraries, by interlibrary loan, or through commercial document delivery services where warranted.

The University Libraries is staffed by a dedicated and service-oriented team consisting of: 100 full-time professional and support personnel, 12 graduate research assistants, and approximately 200 part-time student assistants and wage employees. Approximately 40 percent of the full-time staff is comprised of administrative faculty (primarily librarians) with accredited graduate-level degrees in library/information sciences, and many possessing advanced academic discipline-based degrees as well.

Through membership and active participation in local, regional and national consortia the George Mason University Libraries are able to better respond and meet the needs of the University's growing and diverse academic and research programs. Current inter-institutional affiliations include: VIVA – The Virtual Library of Virginia Program (a Commonwealth of Virginia funded electronic resources program for public higher education institutions), Washington Research Library Consortium (whose membership, besides George Mason, includes American, Catholic, District of Columbia, Gallaudet, George Washington, and Marymount universities), Association of Southeastern Research Libraries (includes over 30 university libraries in the ten-state region), Center for Research Libraries (the Chicago, IL based "research library" for research libraries whose multi-million volume holdings are comprised of specialized and uniquely held materials in North America), and the international Online Computer Library Center (OCLC) whose extensive computerized system and network facilitate national and international library resource sharing activities.

FENWICK LIBRARY

Fenwick Library is the main research library of the University. Fenwick holds most of the Libraries' book collections, as well as current and bound journals, microforms, special collections and archival materials, government documents, and maps. Fenwick also offers access to a large number of electronic resources: networked and stand-alone CD-ROMs; the Libraries' online catalog; bibliographic and fulltext databases; electronic journals; and Internet/Web accessible resources. Librarians provide reference service during regularly scheduled hours in person, through the telephone, and by e-mail; they also teach instruction classes to students in specific programs and departments on information search strategies and sources, and offer individual appointments for in-depth research consultation. Through the library liaison program, librarians work with academic departments to develop local collections and electronic resources. The overarching goal of these activities is to assist students at all levels—undergraduate and graduate—as they become more sophisticated library and information technology users throughout their careers at the university, as well as facilitate faculty endeavors relating to teaching, learning, and research.

Also in Fenwick is the Special Collections and Archives Department. Special Collections and Archives collects, organizes, and preserves books, manuscripts, photographic images, and other items of historical or special interest to the university community; scans and digitizes some especially noteworthy materials for research use (available on the University Libraries web site); and provides "finding aids" for identification and use of special and archival materials. The George Mason University "Authors" collection is also housed in this department. In addition, the department in cooperation and coordination with the Graduate Council provides assistance to the University's graduate programs through centralized management of the process for student submission of theses and dissertations.

Another significant resource of primary research materials held in Fenwick Library is the Government Documents and Maps collection. With both federal and Virginia state documents included, this collection contains items from the administrative, legislative, and judicial branches of government, and constitutes an invaluable source of research materials for students and faculty in a variety of academic disciplines. The Maps collection includes maps produced by the U.S. Geological Survey, as well as commercially published maps and atlases. As a selective depository library, Fenwick receives approximately 50% of the material available through the Federal Depository Library Program, which makes information available to citizens through designated libraries from the world's largest publisher—the U.S. Government. Special expertise is available to assist students and faculty in using and interpreting both print and electronic government information. In addition, special expertise is available for graduate students and faculty who need assistance with statistical software packages and Geographic Information System(GIS) software.

Additional services available at Fenwick Library include the Periodicals and Microforms collections, Circulation, Document Acquisition and Delivery (Interlibrary Loan), and Resources and Collection Management Services departments. The Office of the University Librarian is also located in Fenwick.

JOHNSON CENTER LIBRARY

The Johnson Center Library is part of the George W. Johnson Center, an integrated learning environment at George Mason University. The primary service areas of the Johnson Center Library have been conceived as a prototype of an electronic "gateway" library that supports information access and research activities through the Libraries' information technology systems and the Internet/World Wide Web. Electronic access to scholarly information is supported by a print reference collection, media collections, and a growing circulating book collection comprised of core texts and readings reflecting the interdisciplinary and multicultural emphases in the university's undergraduate curriculum. The Johnson Center Library especially supports interdisciplinary programs such as New Century College through its collections and outreach programs. The library also holds designated discipline-based circulating collections (starting with education and music in academic year 1998/99.)

The Johnson Center Library emphasizes teaching the novice researcher to use library and information resources more confidently in the Johnson Center Library itself, as well as in other libraries and through other channels, whether an area public library, a corporate setting, or from a desktop computer at home. The teaching of the Johnson Center Library provides a foundation for library users in critical thinking skills as they navigate more

complex layers of information throughout their academic careers. The teaching/learning mission of the Johnson Center Library is also an indispensable part of the overall teaching/learning mission of the Johnson Center itself.

The Johnson Center Library also serves as the center for Media collections and services for the University library system. The Media collection includes materials in a variety of formats – videotapes, CD's, audiotapes, laserdiscs, and interactive videodiscs. The video collection of videocassettes and laserdiscs includes documentaries and educational titles from a wide range of disciplines as well as an extensive collection of feature films. The audio collection of compact discs and L.P. records includes a large classical and jazz music selection, as well as popular music titles. The Media collection also includes audiocassettes, primarily unabridged "books on tape" editions of classic literature. The multi-media CD-ROM collection contains titles in the Arts, Humanities, and Sciences. Also available is "the Video Encyclopedia of the 20th Century," a unique collection of 40+ videodiscs which can be used to copy historic video clips to VHS tape for use in class projects, multimedia production, and other activities. All of these materials are available for viewing and/or listening in the library; some are available for external circulation to the University's students, faculty, and staff.

The Johnson Center Library also provides course reserve materials for students on the Fairfax Campus. The Libraries-wide electronic reserves service is also managed at this library. A collection of periodicals (foreign newspapers and general interest magazines and journals) and a leisure reading collection round out the Johnson Center Library's collections and services.

Other notable resources of the Johnson Center Library include an electronic state-of-the-art group instruction room that can accommodate up to 36 persons, and an adaptive technology assistance room for use by persons with physical disabilities.

ARLINGTON CAMPUS LIBRARY

The Arlington Campus Library, located on the Ground Floor of the "original building," is a full-service research facility supporting the teaching and research needs of the non-law Mason students, faculty, and staff on this campus. The library's collection emphasizes international relations and commercial transactions as well as nonprofit management, education, business, finance, trade, and related policy issues. The library holds a core reference collection and is a depository for European Union Documents. Further, the library houses approximately 22,000 pre-1980 bound journal volumes in all disciplines (transferred from Fenwick Library due to space conservation reasons in 1999).

Library staff provide assistance and instruction for faculty, staff, and students in identifying and using various resources. A critical component of the Arlington Campus Library services is access to electronic resources and networked services, as well as inter-campus document delivery requests.

Through contractual arrangement, the Arlington Campus Library also supports a "reserve" collection and provides course reserve services for Virginia Commonwealth University's graduate program in social work.

PRINCE WILLIAM CAMPUS LIBRARY

Prince William Campus Library (PWL) supports the programs and courses offered at the Prince William Campus. Programs include Administration of Justice; Biotechnology; Business; Computer Science; Education; Nursing; and Health, Fitness and Recreation Resources. PWL is located in on the first floor of Academic Building I and offers a full complement of services including access to networked electronic resources and services; orientation to the collection of the libraries' system; course reserves; circulation and reference services; multimedia materials; interCAMPUS and interlibrary loan; instruction in the use of research tools; and assistance with developing strategies for conducting self-guided research. Integrating print, video and electronic resources to meet the research needs of PWL patrons, the emphasis is on instruction in and assistance with the use of electronic resources and computing applications. Within Prince William County, PWL is fostering partnerships for the provision of information resources for PWL patrons, as well as offering information services to the rapidly expanding corporate and technology presence.

Through contractual arrangement, the PWL also provides library support and services to the research personnel of the American Type Culture Collection — George Mason's corporate partner at Prince William campus.

SCHOOL OF LAW LIBRARY

The George Mason School of Law Library combines a growing collection with a high level of information technology support to ensure that students and faculty have optimal access to all available resources for serious scholarly study and research.

Located on three floors of the Law School building on the Arlington Campus, the library offers 340 study carrels and table seats. Separate seminar and computer rooms within the library allow for group study/discussion and computer activities. The library's collection consists of more than 360,000 volumes and volume equivalents, featuring American legal court reports, statutes, encyclopedias, digests, and indices. The library also holds more than 4,600 law reviews and law-related journals and other serials. The library's collections are particularly strong in law and economics, business, banking, economic history and theory, ethics, philosophy, tax, international law, and patent law. As a Federal Government Depository Program participant, the library also regularly receives administrative decisions, executive agency reports, and other related government documents.

Information technology is the key to the management and effective use of the resources and services of the Law Library. The Law Library shares and uses all of the library and information technology resources of George Mason University Libraries (mentioned above), as well as the consortia resource sharing arrangements and networked digital resources (e.g., VIVA, WRLC) as part of the University library system. In addition, there are two major, full-text computer-assisted legal research systems only available at the Law Library: LEXIS and WESTLAW. They are both available to the law students and faculty of George Mason University for educational and research purposes. Although these two legal research systems differ, each includes the full text of judicial opinions and rulings, statutory materials, administrative regulations and decisions, and other legal and law-related resource materials.

The School of Law Library is staffed by 15 full-time employees and additional part-time personnel.

TERMS AND DEFINITIONS

APPLIED/APPLICATIONS/APPLICANTS

The number of admission applications submitted for the reporting term. Individuals submitting multiple applications (e.g., applying for both an undergraduate and a graduate program, or more than one graduate program) are counted once for each application submitted; consequently, the count of graduate applied/applicants/applications may be greater than the number of individuals seeking admission to the university.

APPROVED/APPROVALS

The number of applications that resulted in an offer of admission into the applied-for program for the reporting term, including provisional admissions and other qualified admission statuses.

CERTIFICATE

A formal award certifying the satisfactory completion of a postsecondary program, but which does not qualify as a degree program.

CLASS LEVEL/STUDENT LEVEL**UNDERGRADUATE DEGREE-SEEKING:**

- *Freshman*: A student who has fewer than 30 earned credit hours.
- *Sophomore*: A student who has 30-59 earned credit hours.
- *Junior*: A student who has 60-89 earned credit hours.
- *Senior*: A student who has at least 90 earned credit hours.

GRADUATE DEGREE-SEEKING:

- *Certificate*: A student whose primary program of study is one leading to a post-baccalaureate certificate.
- *Master's*: A student whose primary program of study is one leading to a master's degree.
- *Doctoral Pre-Candidate*: A student whose primary program of study is one leading to a doctoral degree who has not yet completed requirements for advancement to degree candidacy.
- *Doctoral Candidate*: A student whose primary program of study is one leading to a doctoral degree, who has met the university and departmental standards for advancement to degree candidacy. The standards normally include successful completion of all required course work and departmental candidacy examinations.

PROFESSIONAL (LAW) DEGREE-SEEKING:

- Law students are classified as Law Day (full-time program) or Law Evening (part-time program) and by year in program, which is 1, 2, or 3 for Law Day students and 1, 2, 3, or 4 for Law Evening student.

NON-DEGREE-SEEKING:

- Non-degree seeking students are classified only as undergraduate, graduate, or law, based on the level of the coursework being pursued.

CLASSIFICATION OF INSTRUCTIONAL PROGRAMS (CIP) CODE

Six-digit code that classifies instructional programs. The 1990 revision is the version currently in use.

CONTRACT COURSE

A course offered by contractual arrangement that may be paid for as a unit rather than via tuition charges to individual students.

CREDIT HOUR

A unit of measure of course work, independent study, or a related activity, that can be applied toward meeting the requirements of a degree, certificate, or other formal award.

DEGREE-SEEKING STUDENT

A student enrolled in courses for credit who is recognized by the institution as seeking a degree or formal award.

ENROLLED/ENROLLEES

Students registered for more than zero credit hours on the census date for the reporting term. New enrollees approved for admission to multiple programs are counted only once, under the program designated as their primary program of study.

FIRST-TIME FRESHMAN

- *Admissions*: An applicant who has never attended any postsecondary institution since graduation from high school, or whose only postsecondary enrollment was in the summer term immediately prior to a fall applied-for term.
- *Student enrollment*: New students who qualify as first-time freshman admissions, including those with sufficient Advanced Placement credit to be granted sophomore class standing.

EXTENDED STUDIES

The enrollment program that serves non-degree-seeking students.

TERMS AND DEFINITIONS

FULL-TIME EQUIVALENT (FTE) STUDENT

A statistic derived from the student-credit hour productivity of the institution. In non-summer terms, the number of FTE students is obtained by dividing the total number of undergraduate, first professional (law), and graduate credit hours per term by 15, 15, and 12 respectively. The number of FTE students in summer, and annualized regular session (fall and spring semesters) is obtained by dividing the total number of undergraduate, first professional, and graduate credit hours per session by 30, 30, and 24 respectively. This definition should be distinguished from the definition of a full-time student.

FULL-TIME STUDENT

An undergraduate student enrolled for 12 or more credit hours in a term, a graduate student enrolled for 9 or more credit hours in a term, or a law student classified as a day student in a term.

GRADUATE STUDENT

A student enrolled in a master's, doctoral, or post-baccalaureate certificate program, not including law students. A non-degree-seeking student enrolled in graduate-level classes is also considered a graduate student.

GUEST MATRICULANT

A student taking course work at George Mason and applying the credit toward a degree at another institution.

HEADCOUNT STUDENT

The number of students enrolled for more than zero credit hours in courses offered for degree or certificate credit, including students who are not admitted to a degree program (extended studies). When student headcount is reported by academic division/department, the headcount is attributed to the department that administers the student's primary program of study.

IN-STATE STUDENT

A student whose official domicile is in the commonwealth of Virginia.

LOWER DIVISION--BACCALAUREATE

- *Courses:* courses that are part of a baccalaureate program, generally taken by freshmen and sophomores, with course numbers in the range 100-299.
- *Students:* students classified as freshmen or sophomores (those with fewer than 60 earned credit hours).

NEW STUDENT

A student whose enrollment in the term is the consequence of an application for admission for the term.

NON-DEGREE-SEEKING GRADUATE STUDENT

A student enrolled in graduate-level courses for credit who is not recognized as accepted into a degree or certificate program and who cannot be classified by student level.

NON-DEGREE-SEEKING STUDENT

A student enrolled in courses for credit who is not recognized as seeking a degree or certificate.

NON-DEGREE-SEEKING UNDERGRADUATE STUDENT

A student enrolled in undergraduate-level courses for credit who is not recognized as seeking a degree or certificate and who cannot be classified by student level.

NON-RESIDENT ALIEN

A person who is not a citizen or national of the United States and who is in this country on a visa or temporary basis and does not have the right to remain indefinitely. (Source: IPEDS)

OUT-OF-STATE STUDENT

A student whose official domicile is not the commonwealth of Virginia, and who therefore does not ordinarily qualify for in-state tuition rates.

PART-TIME STUDENT

An undergraduate enrolled for fewer than 12 credit hours in a term, a graduate student enrolled for fewer than 9 credit hours in a term, or a law student classified as an evening student in a term.

POST-BACCALAUREATE CERTIFICATE

An award that requires completion of an organized program of study beyond the level of a bachelor's degree, but which does not meet the requirements of academic degrees carrying the title of master.

PROGRAM/ACADEMIC PROGRAM

A combination of courses and related activities organized for the attainment of broad educational objectives.

TERMS AND DEFINITIONS

RACE/ETHNICITY

Categories used to describe groups to which individuals belong or with which they identify. The categories do not denote scientific definitions of anthropological origins. A person may be counted in only one group. In official reporting only U.S. citizens and permanent residents (resident aliens) are grouped by race/ethnicity. The groups used to categorize all students are:

- African American/Black, Non-Hispanic
- American Indian or Alaskan Native
- Asian or Pacific Islander
- Hispanic
- White, Non-Hispanic
- Non-Resident Alien

RE-ADMITTED STUDENT

A student returning to the institution after an unofficial absence to resume a program of study, who has not attended another postsecondary institution during the absence, and whose re-enrollment requires formal approval. Formal approval to re-enroll is normally required after an unofficial absence of two or more non-summer terms, or after being formally dismissed. In most reporting, re-admitted students are counted among returning/continuing students. Students who attend another post-secondary institution during an unofficial absence are required to submit a complete application for admission, and are counted among new students.

RESIDENT ALIEN

A person who is not a citizen or national of the United States, and who has been lawfully admitted for permanent residence (and who holds alien registration receipt cards Form I-551/155). (Source: IPEDS)

RETURNING/CONTINUING STUDENT

A student whose eligibility to enroll in the term does not require the submission of a formal application for admission.

TRANSFER STUDENT

A student entering the institution for the first time or re-entering to resume a prior level, and known to have previously attended a postsecondary institution at the same level. A student who was dual-enrolled at a college or university while still enrolled in high school is counted as a first-time freshman, not as a transfer student.

UNCLASSIFIED STUDENT

A student whose enrollment cannot be classified by student level.

UPPER DIVISION--BACCALAUREATE

Courses: courses that are part of a baccalaureate program, generally taken by juniors and seniors, with course numbers in the range 300-599.

Students: students classified as juniors or seniors (those with at least 60 earned credit hours).

TERMS AND DEFINITIONS

DEFINITIONS FOR FACULTY AND STAFF**ADMINISTRATIVE/PROFESSIONAL FACULTY**

Administrative/professional faculty perform work directly related to the administration, management, and support of the educational and general activities of the university. Incumbents in administrative faculty positions exercise discretion and independent judgement and generally direct the work of others. Professional faculty require advanced learning and experience acquired by prolonged formal instruction and/or specialized work experience. This category is normally limited to librarians, counselors, coaches, and other professional positions.

EMINENT SCHOLAR STIPENDS

Monies paid from GMU Foundation endowment funds and the State Eminent Scholars Matching Program to supplement the salaries of eminent full-time scholars such as the Robinson Professors.

FULL-TIME FACULTY

Full-time, instructional and research personnel holding the traditional ranks of professor, associate professor, assistant professor, and instructor. Designated as instructional or research faculty.

GRADUATE ASSISTANTS

Enrolled graduate students holding the positions of graduate teaching assistant or graduate research assistant. Traditionally, these positions are 20 hours per week.

INSTRUCTIONAL FACULTY

Faculty whose primary funding is from an Educational and General ledger one instructional account and whose primary purpose is instruction. Most salary comparisons such as AAUP are based only on full-time, instructional faculty.

PART-TIME FACULTY

Part-time or adjunct faculty hired for instruction with semester or year-long contracts.

RESEARCH FACULTY

Faculty whose primary funding is from a research account and whose primary purpose is research.

RESTRICTED/FIXED TERM FACULTY

Faculty not eligible for tenure, hired under contracts of fixed terms.

PROBATIONARY/TENURE TRACK/TENURE STREAM FACULTY

Faculty eligible for, but not yet awarded tenure.

TENURED FACULTY

Faculty awarded appointments without a fixed term, with periodic review.

TERMINAL DEGREE

The highest earned degree in a discipline. In most cases, this is the doctorate (Ph.D./Ed.D.). In the fine arts, the M.F.A. or master's degree is considered the highest, appropriate degree. The J.D. in law is considered a professional degree.
